The often-difficult decision of who will be Nebraska's starting quarter-back in the fall has become a little less complicated.

Quarterbacks Todd Gragnano and Matt Jones have joined linebacker Brian Havens in transferring from the Cornhusker program to other schools

Gragnano and Jones, who were both competing for Nebraska's starting quarterback position, departed the program as redshirt sophomores.

Gragnano, who hails from Fountain Valley, Calif., will be attending Louisville, while the Michigan City, Ind. native Jones, will be playing at Southern Illinois.

Both quarterbacks were listed on USA Today's Top 100 recruiting lists

With the absence of the high school standouts, the players expected to fill the shoes of last year's top signal-caller Keithen McCantare senior Mike Grant, redshirt freshman Tony Veland and recruits Tommie Frazier and Ben

Nebraska Football Coach Tom

Osborne said the Huskers' abundance of quarterbacks was the main reason for the duo's departure.

"They were welcome to stay, but they had a younger guy (Veland) play-ing ahead of them," Osborne said. "And with Frazier and Rutz coming

in, they're chances of playing a sig-nificant role was questionable."

Last year, Gragnano took part in one play, in which he completed a one-yard pass for a touchdown, while Jones sat out to use his redshirt sea-

Osborne said the pair will be better

suited in their new programs.
"With Gragnano, his speed needs to be in a drop-back passing offense," Osborne said. "Jones did everything well, but he was very impatient and wanted to go somewhere where he could be a two or three-year starter.

The Nebraska coach said the absence of the two players might actually be a blessing in the quarterback

"It makes the situation better, because now we're not so cluttered," Osborne said.

On the other side of the field, the departure of Havens came as little surprise after he was permanently suspended for participating in a brawl in the spring between Husker football and baseball players.
