Linebacker injures knee in practice

The Cornhusker defense suffered a tremendous blow on Wednesday in its preparation for Saturday's game with No. 2 Washington.

Inside linebacker and two-year starter Mike Anderson injured his knee early in Wednesday's work-out and is listed as doubtful for Saturday's game in Scattle. Husker coach Tom Osborne al-

luded that Anderson's absence could be costly to the Husker defense

"He strained his knee and it doesn't look very good," Osborne said. "I don't think it's anything long-term, but I'd say it will be very doubtful that he'll play Saturday.

Anderson, who was Nebraska's second leading tackler last season and an honorable mention All-Big Eight selection, injured his knee during a drill at the start of practice.

Anderson's likely replacement will be Troy Branch. Branch, a junior from Camden, N.J., played in all 11 games for the Huskers last season and was a member of the Phillips 66 Big Eight Academic Honor Roll.

Osborne said if Anderson does miss Saturday's game, the defense will make the necessary adjustments

"It's likely that Branch will play," Osborne said. "But we'll have to sit down (with Anderson) and talk it over. If he doesn't play, we'll adjust.'

Outside linebacker David White was the only other player hurt Wednesday. White was acciden-tally kicked during a scrimmage and missed the last half of practice, but Osborne said he will be ready for the game on Saturday

Huskies hope to stop Huskers in running game

The running game. Every football fan from Lincoln to Seattle - along with Washington defensive back Walter Bailey knows that running is Nebraska's strong suit.

But Bailey will have to defend the Huskers' attack, and the confidence

they have in it. "If they have success running, I'd keep doing it," Bailey said. "If you can't stop it, what can you do about it?'

Bailey and the Washington defense has given up big plays in early-season wins over Arizona State and Wisconsin, but the Huskies have held their opponents to seven points in

each of those games. "(Arizona State and Wisconsin) didn't really think they could line up and beat us; but I know Nebraska thinks they can line up and beat us," Bailey said.

He said the Huskies' defensive line would be tested by the nation's leading offense, especially with the loss of All-American Steve Emtman.

"I feel confident in (the defensive line)," Bailey said. "At the same time, they're going to attack us, but at the same time we have to back each other. "We have improved over the last

three weeks.

The Huskies will use a variety of defensive schemes to disrupt the Husker running attack, said the 5-foot-11 senior from Portland, Ore.

The 190-pound Bailey will likely be a factor in any disruption the Huskies' defense causes. Bailey is a leading candidate for the Thorpe Award, given to the top defensive back in the nation. He also is listed by The Sporting News as the top collegiate cornerback

Bailey led the Huskies with seven interceptions in 1991 in earning sec-

ond-team All Pac-10 honors. Bailey's covering ability could be well tested against Nebraska. The Huskers use play action in their passing attack, something the Huskies don't see often.

"We see a lot of play action in practice," Bailey said. "But it's kind of different on each team. It's kind of hard to play action our defense with how many guys we have coming at the quarterback

"(Nebraska) has shown in the few games we've seen that they mix it up. They throw a lot of short stuff, but we

Last year the Huskies came into Lincoln, and it was a new experience for players like Bailey. He said he enjoyed playing in front of the loud Memorial Stadium crowd, but added he was glad that it was the Huskies' turn to be the noisy host.

"For me I was scared to death. It was my first start," Bailey said. "I was tense, but after the second half they got tired and we got stronger as the econd half went along
