Wesley Snipes joins Scagal, Willis and Van Damme in the exalted ranks of "bad-guy stompers at the box office" with his latest film "Passenger 57" (Douglas 3, Edgewood 3).

Snipes portrays John Cutter, an anti-terrorist expert on a flight from Florida to California to discuss a new job that his buddy Sly Delvecchio (Tom Sizemore, "Flight of the Intruder") helped him get.
