Continued from Page 1 rapes, eight robberies and 56 assaults. The property crimes included 82 burglaries, 286 larcenies and 14 vehicle thefts.

The highest violent crime total in southeast Lincoln was 12. This included one robbery and 11 assaults.

The same southeast area reported 221 property crimes: 55 burglaries, larcenies and 10 vehicle thefts.

But Peschong, who has policed the Malone area since 1976, said there were many factors that could distort those numbers.

For example, both the Malone area and the area around the state Capitol have many people passing through them every day — either to go downtown, to the UNL campus - either to or to the Malone Center.

Southeast Lincoln, on the other hand, is mainly surrounded by other residential areas, and the movement of people through the area is kept to crime.

Therefore, the crime rates probably do not reflect the amount of crime accurately, Peschong said.

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The majority of the crimes around UNL probably do not involve the people who live in the area, he said.
"Wherever you have a high

volume of people coming and going, that is apt to generate crime," he said.

The Malone area, Peschong said, has changed over time and is now more geared to crime prevention.

"I think the makeup of the community has changed a little bit, he said. "We used to have a lot more single-family dwellings, but many have been torn down and replaced with apartment com-

The older homes, he said, did not have air conditioning, and their residents often left windows or doors open to get a breeze. Thus, they created an opportunity for

"If we can eliminate opportunity, that's the best deterrent we can do.

In addition, Peschong said he thought the lighting had improved in the area, noting that many of the bushes that used to line the sidewalks had been removed.

These changes decrease the possibility that a person would be

caught by surprise, Peschong said. Peschong said he doubted the area had any special qualities that would attract either rapists or drug

"Drugs have no boundaries," he said. "We have arrested people on narcotics possession in all areas.

'(And) I don't think that particular area of town creates any more of a threat to a female walking alone at night than other areas of town.'

Peschong said he would have no qualms about living in the Malone

"Generally I feel that it's a pretty peaceful neighborhood," he said. 'But that doesn't mean it's without its problems."
