Talk of the Big Ten Conference expanding to 12 teams and pulling in a Big Eight school has Nebraska football coach Tom Osborne crossing his fingers and hoping that the Big Eight Conference stays in tact. Osborne said he hoped that the Big

en will look somewhere besides th Big Eight in its search for a 12th member.

"I'd like to see the Big Eight stay as it is," he said. "You would hope the rest of the Big Eight schools are honest and don't surprise anybody." The Omaha World-Herald report-

ed Thursday that Nebraska was one of five schools mentioned for possible expansion at last week's Big Ten Kick-off preseason meetings in Rosemont,

Penn State became the 11th mem-ber of the Big Ten Conference in 1991. If the conference adds a 12th school it could divide the conference into two divisions of six teams and have championship game similar to the one held by the Southeastern Con-


