Viaduct reconstruction continues

Officials hope to one-third of the way done. The old bridge has been torn down completefinish overpass by year's end

Progress on the 10th Street over-pass has been delayed by rain and stormy weather, but city crews are still optimistic they can complete the project by the new year, a city official said.

Al Imig, a city engineer, said rain had slowed the progress somewhat, but he said the crews, if given good weather, could complete the overpass

"Right now it looks like mid-December," he said.

The overpass is a \$5.25 million city project designed to replace the 75- to 80-year-old viaduct over the railroad tracks, which had become


