"I think he's all right," Osborne said. "It's kind of a minor sprain. Of course, you never know about swelling.


Co-captain Trev Alberts, the No. 1 right outside linebacker, returned to practice Wednesday after sitting out Tuesday with a sore back.

An abundance of basketball in the summer put the Nebraska basketball player on crutches

Jack Nickolite, Nebraska's basketball trainer, said that Badgett, a 6-foot-6 forward from Omaha, had been experiencing pain in his left foot for the past three weeks of the summer. A stress fracture was discovered in

the foot during a routine physical last

Nickolite said that Badgett did not injure his foot in one specific incident.

Fracture forces Badgett to rest

"Badgett's injury came from con-tinual stress and pounding he took on his foot over time," Nickolite said.

Badgett had surgery on Saturday to insert a screw into the bone.

"With the screw in place, any re-injury of the foot should be prevent-ed," Nickolite said.

He said Badgett will be on crutches for one to three weeks before he be-gins a gradual rehabilitation.
