The Nebraska men's tennis team opened its season last weekend at the Tom Fallon Invitational hosted by Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind.

Five Cornhusker men won matches, but Andy Davis was the only Husker to win his first match and advance.

Davis, a sophomore from Scottsdale, Ariz., defeated Andrew Stern of Miami University 6-7, 6-1, 6-

1 in A flight singles.

Davis lost in the second round 6-7, 2-6 to Andy Zurcher of Notre Dame.

Goeffrey Lance, a freshman from Huntingdon Valley, Pa., advanced to the second round in the consolation bracket of the B flight singles.

Lance lost 3-6, 6-7 to Eric Sellenrich from Miami University, but came back to win his first match in the consolation bracket 8-1 over Jeremy Sutter of Illinois.

Freshman Dino Teppara from

Mississauga, Ontario, won a first-round consolation bracket match in the C flight singles, 8-5.

Teppara defeated Clayton Jennings of Furman after losing to Krunch Kloberdanz of Vanderbilt 6-7, 1-6.

Nebraska's Adrian Maizey won his B flight singles preliminary match with Mark Eisenbud of Purdue 2-6, 6-2, 6-3.

Anthony Kotaric also won a preliminary match in the A flight singles consolation bracket.

Classic names 3 Huskers to team

In the Kickoff Classic's 10 years of existence, Nebraska has played in the classic twice and won both times.

They now have been rewarded by having three Cornhuskers named to the Kickoff Classic All-Decade Team, which commemorates the first decade of college football's traditional season opener.

Two members of the 1983 Cornhusker offensive line which helped Mike Rozier to the Heisman

Trophy were named to the team.

Dean Steinkuhler, the Outland and Lombardi Trophy winner in 1983, was named as an offensive guard on the team. Steinkuhler went on to play for Houston in the National Football League from 1984-91.

Mark Traynowicz, an All-American center, was named the center of the team. Traynowicz was a second-round pick by Buffalo, and he played in the NFL from 1985-89.

Husker coach Tom Osborne was named as the coach of the all-

decade team. Osborne led his team to two wins in the Kickoff Classic. He is the only coach to win two Kickoff Classics.

Brigham Young leads the list with four inductees out of the 25 total inductees.

Among other well-known players, Eddie Brown, now a wide receiver with Cincinnati, was named to the team. Kevin Fagan, now in his eighth year with San Francisco, also was selected after his career at Miami. Another San Francisco player selected was Bill Romanowski.

Nebraska-Iowa football series may resume soon

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — Nebraska could return to Iowa's football schedule soon and Iowa also might revive a long dormant series with Missouri.

Iowa athletic director Bob Bowlsby says he has been talking to both schools about scheduling games. He said he and Nebraska athletic director Bill Byrne have tentatively set two games in the late 1990s.

Nebraska and Iowa last met in 1982.

"I'm sure we'll get a series worked out," Bowlsby said.

Bowlsby said he also is confident about getting Missouri on the schedule. Iowa and Missouri haven't played since 1910.

"That would be a ways down the road and it hasn't been finalized," Bowlsby said. "But we're hopeful of working something out."

Nebraska and Missouri both have been mentioned as a possible 12th member for the Big Ten, which has expanded to 11 schools with the recent addition of Penn State. If one of those would join the league, they could appear on Iowa's schedule sooner than expected.

Bowlsby said he has received favorable reaction to getting Northern Iowa on the schedule in 1995 and 1997. Both games will be in Iowa City.

"When I was at Northern Iowa, I thought a series with Iowa was a good idea and I still think it has merit," said Bowlsby, who used to be Northern Iowa's athletic director.

"Northern Iowa has a good series with Iowa State and Northern Iowa will be a good opponent for Iowa."
