Wildcats want a win, back says

Kansas State is coming into Lincoln with a much different attitude this year.

Runningback J.J. Smith said the 5-0 Wildcats had built up their confidence enough to think in terms of beating the 5-0 Cornhuskers Saturday in Memorial Stadium.

"We're coming in expecting a tough game, but we're preparing to win," Smith said. "In the past, it seemed like when we played Nebraska it was more of a thing where we were just trying not to lose. This year is different."

The Wildcats are coming off an emotional 10-9 victory last Saturday over rival Kansas that preserved their winning streak.

The win, Smith said, may give Kansas State the same boost it did when the Wildcats finished 7-4 in 1991.

"That is always such a big game for us," he said. "Two years ago when we beat them, it seemed to spring us through the rest of the season. Hopefully, that will be the case again."

Kansas State may need a little boost against its next three opponents — Nebraska, Colorado and Oklahoma.

"Our goal is to get in a bowl game,

and with five wins we're not very far off," Smith said. "Every week is going to get tougher and tougher. We know we have a chance in every game; and if we keep doing our best, we should be able to get to a bowl."

Smith has rushed for 429 yards on 90 carries this season. He gained 232 yards on 51 carries in 1992 as Eric Gallon's backup. "It's one of my personal goals to be one of the leading rushers in the conference," Smith said. "I've just been trying to lead by example."

"I think most of us are doing a good job of that, considering we are 5-0."

Dirksen calls Oregon meet tough

Nebraska will get the chance to see some nationally ranked teams.

"This meet gives us a chance to see how we compete against teams around the nation that we normally don't get to see," he said.

The men will compete against No. 14 Oregon, No. 12 Wake Forest, No. 13 Washington and No. 9 Portland.

The No. 15 women will face sev-

enth-ranked Oregon, among others.

Along with trying to be competitive in the meet, the Huskers are looking to fine-tune before the Big Eight Championships Oct. 30 at Columbia, Mo.

"This is a great meet for the time of the year," Dirksen said. "This is the last meet before we really get into the championship phase of the season."

"We're probably going to have a tough time winning the meet. But how you run is just as important as where you place."

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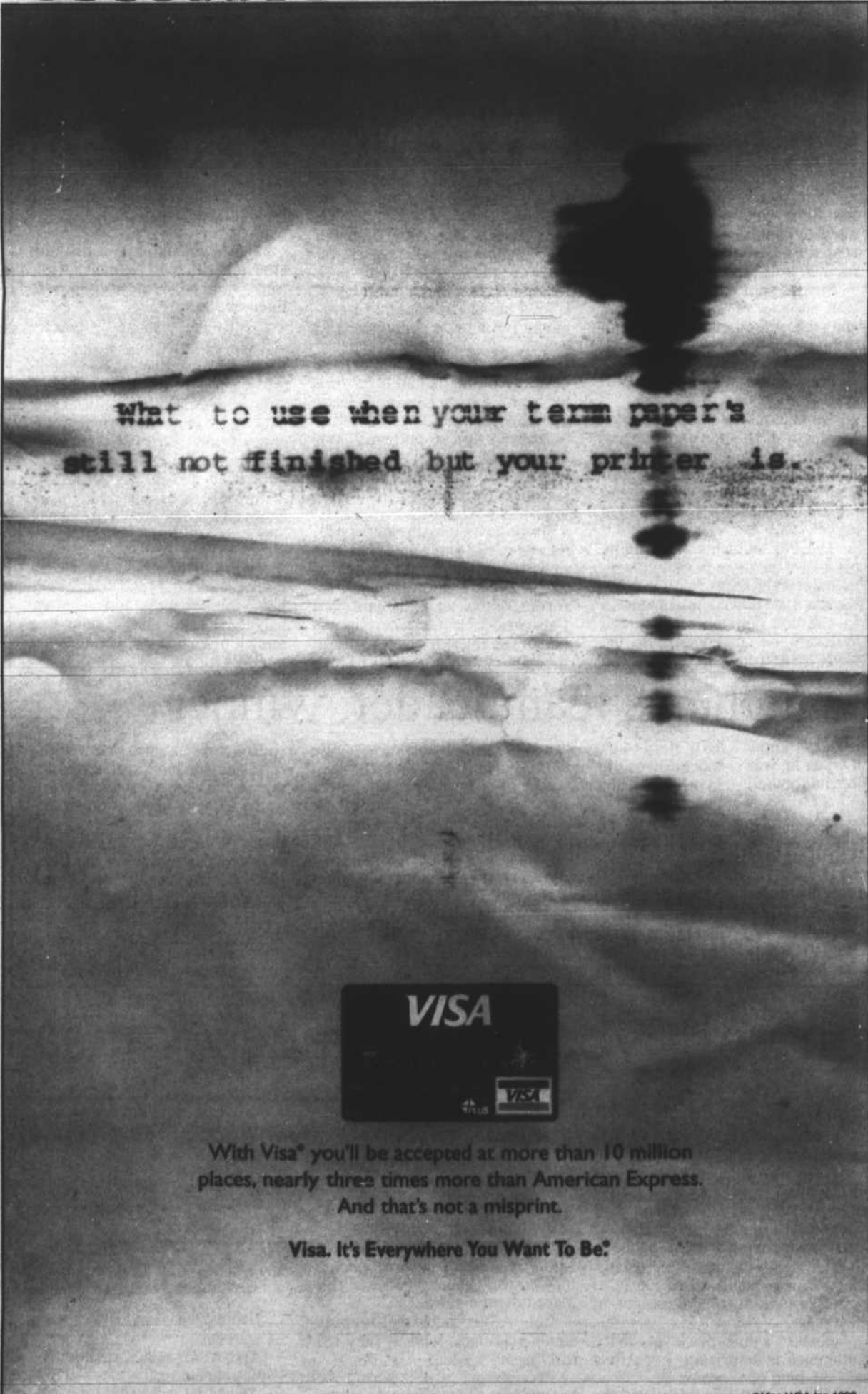
"We have had our ups and downs, but I'm really not surprised," he said.
