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Nebraska Legislature, in light of current budget restrictions.

"They'll ask how we can find the money to spend on this," Benes said. Spanier said much of the money for the project would come from funds left over from last year's budget.

"The money is in the bank for this," he said. "It will not take away from any other program."

Silhacek also said the park would reduce parking on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus and force more students to park away from campus at night.

Brian Kubik, speaker of the Association of Students of the University of Nebraska senate, said ASUN was not opposed to campus beautification, but he said building the park was not practical right now.

Spanier said the lot was not for student parking anyway and removing it would not displace student traffic "whatsoever."

Spanier said the university's acquisition of the Union Insurance Building on 14th Street alone would add 103 parking spaces.

Construction of North Plaza Park should begin in April and be completed by August, according to the chancellor's report.

In other business, the board:
 ● Approved a \$811,000 project to replace the sound system at Memorial Stadium.

● Approved \$739,825 to make repairs and improvements in the University Health Center, Nebraska Unions, the Nebraska Bookstore and university housing facilities.

Also, the board was told the presidential search committee narrowed the list of candidates to replace Martin Massengale to eight people.

Regent Nancy O'Brien, chairwoman of the committee, said arrangements were being made for the regents to interview candidates this month.

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Omaha, then it's a sham," O'Brien said.

Other regents pointed out that last month the board agreed the consultant's charge should not be skewed toward a particular solution.

Regent Charles Wilson of Lincoln said telling consultants to address the possibility of a separate college violated that board guideline.

He said consultants also should look at separate colleges in other parts of the state.

"Why not put that in as well as the Omaha engineering college suggestion?" Wilson asked.

Both Skrupa's and Wilson's amendments failed. The original, non-specific proposal passed.

J.B. Milliken, corporation secretary for the board, said even though the charge did not include a specific reference to a separate college in Omaha, the consultants were aware of the issue.

Milliken said he hoped the consultants could conclude their study in a few months.

The consultants are: Donald Langenberg, chancellor of the University of Maryland System; James Halligan, president of New Mexico State University; Charles James, dean of the College of Engineering and Applied Science at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee; and John Christian, vice president of Stone and Webster Engineering Corporation.

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
