League moves toward parity, coaches say

With the emergence of Kansas State as a legitimate contender to break into the top three of the conference, Big Eight coaches said Monday that the league may be moving toward parity.

"I don't know if there is any team, except for maybe Nebraska, that is going to be able to make it through this thing undefeated," Iowa State coach Jim Walden said during the Big Eight coaches weekly teleconference.

Walden said the competition in the Big Eight was improving each season and each week because of the relatively equal strength of the top teams in the league.

"I don't think we have the one dominant team that we've had in the past," Walden said. "I think it makes for great competition within the conference, but I'm not sure what that does for us nationally."

With the assurance that they would get the ball to start the second half, the Kansas State Wildcats lined up on Nebraska's 4-yard line Saturday, planning to cut the Husker lead to 28-21.

But with 45 seconds left in the first half, Nebraska free safety Tyrone Williams had another idea

Williams' interception at the goal line even-tually led to a Nebraska field goal, which increased the Husker halftime lead to 31-14. Nebraska went on to win 45-28.

"Everybody looks to make those kind of big plays," Williams said. "They were about to

score and, with them getting the ball in the second half, we needed something like that to happen

Williams said the pass, which was a quarterback throwback from tailback J.J. Smith to quarterback Chad May, did not fool at him at all.

"Smith was running toward the other side, but what caught my eye was that (May) sprinted out to the flat after he handed off," Williams said. "I just broke over to (May), and once he threw it I made the move on the ball.

Despite the Williams' interception, Kansas State never gave up. The Wildcats pulled to within 31-28 with 7:44 left in the game, behind a Big Eight-record 489 passing yards by May.

Williams said Nebraska's defense was

shocked Saturday.

"He is a big, strong kid and I think he surprised all of us with his strength throwing the football," Williams said. "I think Kansas State was a well-prepared team. They came in and played a good game. They're going to surprise some teams the rest of the year.

The defense was not proud of giving up 565 total yards Saturday, Williams said.

"Sure, I got that interception, but I don't think I finished the game very strong," he said. "Our defense is a lot better than this but we do have a need for improvement. We had a lot of little, mental mistakes that just killed us." Despite the breakdowns, Williams, a 6-foot,
