"I didn't shoot the ball well," Piatkowski said. "I was a little tired, but it was a great team effort."

"This entire tournament, you can look back and the entire team was doing a phenomenal job."

Johnson, Boone and Erick Strickland, who had 13 points and three rebounds, stepped up to lift the Huskers to the victory over the Cowboys.

"Pike's our go-to guy, but when he's not having an on night, someone has to step up to fill the void," Strickland said. "Jamar stepped up, and so did Jaron."

Johnson had a team-high 19 points and Strickland hit three key 3-pointers, including one with 10:28 left in the game to put the Huskers up for good 52-48.

But the Cowboys answered every time Nebraska got out to a lead.

Oklahoma State was within four points with 2:50 left when Husker forward Melvin Brooks connected on a 3-point play to give Nebraska a 66-59 lead.

Nee said Nebraska's bench play, including Strickland, Brooks and senior forward Tom Best, won the game for the Huskers.

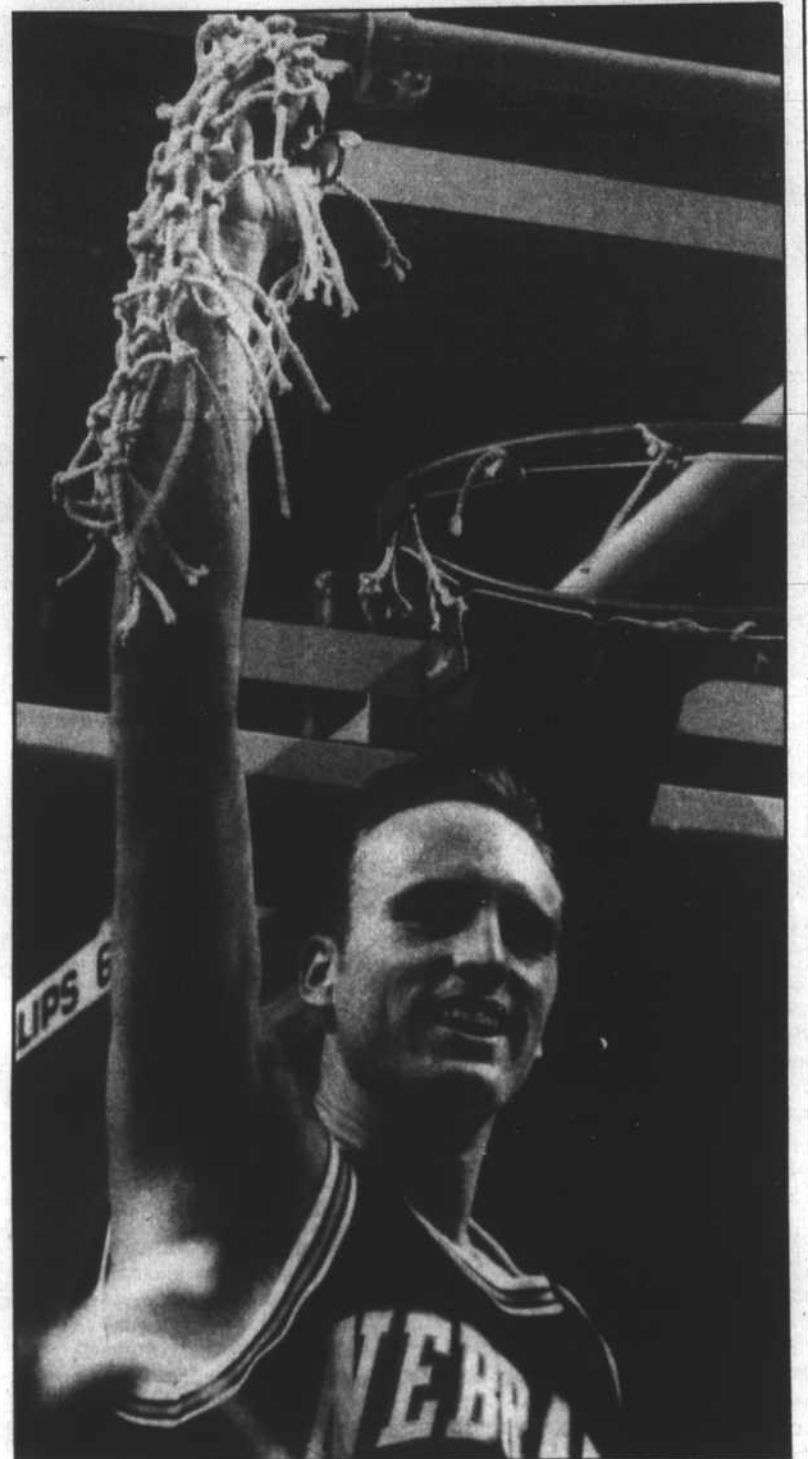
"When you go to your bench, magic things have to happen," he said. "Melvin Brooks had a magic game."

NU women fifth in NCAA track

The Nebraska women's track and field team had some success this weekend at the NCAA Indoor Championships in Indianapolis.

The Cornhusker women tied for fifth place with Arizona with 26 points. Louisiana State won the women's title by scoring 48 points.

The Nebraska men tied for 24th by scoring 8 points. Arkansas won its 11th indoor championship with an NCAA-record 94 points.

The women were led by triple jumper Nicola Marital. The sophomore took second place with a leap of 43 feet, 1 inch. Telisa Young of Texas won with a jump of 43 feet, 3 3/4 inches.

On Friday, Kwani Stewart finished third in the 55-meter hurdles. Stewart's time of 7.76 seconds placed her behind Dionne Rose of Middle Tennessee State and Illinois' Tonya Williams.

Stewart continued her success in the long jump by finishing seventh. She had a jump of 20

feet, 1 1/2 inches.

Shanelle Porter, who won last year's 400-meter dash, placed eighth this year with a time of 53.81 seconds.

Paulette Mitchell finished fifth in the shot put with a throw of 54 feet, 5 1/4 inches.

Also, Nebraska's Theresa Stelling was seventh in the 3,000-meter run with a time of 9:32.06.

The women's 4-by-400-meter relay team used a time of 3:42.07 to finish eighth.

On the men's side, Mark Graham finished seventh in the 400-meter dash. The freshman had a time of 46.97 seconds.

The men's 4-by-400-meter relay team had a time of 3:09.05 to finish ninth.

On Friday, the men got points from Willie Hibler and Petar Malesev.

Hibler finished sixth in the 55-meter hurdles with a time of 7.36 seconds. Malesev finished seventh in the high jump with a leap of 7 feet, 3 inches.

"In the past couple of years," he said, "we have been in awe of just getting to the tournament. I think getting over the Big Eight tournament hump is really going to help us."

Nee said this team had a better chance to win than the 1991 team, which went into the tournament with a 26-7 record and a No. 3 seed. The 1991 Huskers lost 89-84 to 14th-seeded Xavier, Ohio.

"The difference between the 1991 team and the '94 team is the maturity of how to handle it," Nee said. "Our team really is focused. I can tell from the little meeting we just had. They want to play basketball. They want more than this."

How much more can the Huskers get?

"I think we can get to the Sweet 16," Boone said.

"Anything can happen," Johnson said. "It's tournament time and anything can happen. And that's our goal — to make something happen. Right now we're on a roll. We're just thinking six games."
