Wistrom excited for home opener

When the first- and second-ranked Nebraska football team plays host to UCLA Saturday in its home opener, it will mark the first time Grant Wistrom has ever been to a game at Memorial Stadium.

However, Wistrom will have a per-bective different than those of most of the new faces at the game.

He will be on the field. The 6-foot-5, 230-pound outside linebacker from Webb City, Mo., said he had been looking forward to this game since before his arrival in Lincoln.

"It's just going to be crazy," Wistrom said. "I can't imagine what the atmosphere for that game is going to be like.

Wistrom, who was named by SuperPrep as the Midlands region defensive player-of-the-year last year. chose Nebraska over Michigan. He is the only true freshman on the Nebraska team to see action so far this season.

Cornerback Octavious McFarlin probably will be the only other Husker freshman to skip a redshirt year.

After an impressive fall camp, Wistrom began his move up the depth chart. He made it all the way up to the


