NU hopes to have healthy team for match with Duke

Huskers must have strong defense | Duke coach says Nebraska crowd to get past Blue Devils, coach says

The Nebraska volleyball team got a chance to see what its reserves had to offer on Wednesday night in Columbia, Mo.

The Huskers not only were without the services of starting middle blocker Jen McFadden (back spasms), starting outside hitter Billie Winsett (strep throat) and specialist Stephanie Clerc (back spasms). Coach Terry Pettit also stayed behind because of a stomach ailment.

Nebraska, 12-0, hopes to have everyone back when it plays host to 8-1 Duke at 7:30 p.m. tonight and Saturday night at the University of Nebraska Coliseum.

Assistant coach Cathy Noth, 1-0 as a head coach after Wednesday's 15-1, 15-4, 15-9 sweep of the Tigers, said Winsett would return, but McFadden's status was yet to be de-

"McFadden is still wait and see," Noth said. "We'll see how she is feeling and decide before the match.

Duke travels to Lincoln after its first loss of the season, a five-game defeat at the hands of North Carolina on Tuesday night in Durham, N.C. The defending Atlantic Coast Conference champions return four starters from a team that finished 1993 with a 30-3 record and lost to Texas in the NCAA tournament.

"They are a top 20 team," Noth said of Duke, ranked 18th in the latest Volleyball Monthly poll. "When we are playing a top 20 team, we need to stop their offense.

The Blue Devils, coached by Jon Wilson, have faced Nebraska only once in school history, beating the Huskers in 1976.

"Their coach is a very disciplined and respectable coach," Noth said. "I am sure their team is a reflection of him."

Less than one week after senior Peggy Meyer filled in for McFadden and set a career high with 17 kills against New Mexico, Kate Crnich set a record of her own filling in for

Crnich recorded a personal-best eight kills against the Tigers. Noth said the 5-foot-11 outside hitter from River Forest, Ill., gave the Huskers a needed lift.

"Kate Crnich came in and did a good job," she said. "When we have girls go down with injuries, the rest of the team has to come in and step it up a notch.

Noth said she enjoyed her one-game stint as coach, even though she knew it was short-

"That was a great opportunity," she said, "and it's something that is not going to come around real often.

And even though the Blue Devils lost, Duke coach Jon Wilson said his team was up to the task of playing No. 2 Nebraska.

"Coming off of a loss has traditionally been successful with this team," Blue Devil coach Jon Wilson said. "For the last four or five years, they have responded to a loss by coming back strong, and that is what we are looking for this

Wilson knows what caliber of team will face Duke at the NU Coliseum tonight and Satur-

'Nebraska has nothing to exploit," Wilson said. "They really don't have a weak spot where you can consistently get points.
"They are a very solid team physically, and

expect a long, hard battle."

Duke has won the only contest between the two schools, and that was almost 20 years ago in 1976, when the Devils beat the Huskers in







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
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
