For Oklahoma coach Gary Gibbs. the 45-7 loss at Colorado Saturday may have been the final blow to his job as the Sooners' head coach.

For Iowa State coach Jim Walden, this season has been a combination of punches.

After losses again last Saturday, Gibbs and Walden both addressed the need for victories this weekend during the Big Eight teleconference Monday.

The Sooners play at Kansas, while the Cyclones take on Oklahoma State in Stillwater.

Gibbs, who saw his team drop out of the Top 25 after dropping to 3-3, said losing to Colorado was no rea-son for Oklahoma to hang its head.

This is by far the most talented Colorado team I've played against since I've been here at Oklahoma." he said. "They certainly were good his team, not his future coaching stain 1989 when they played for the na- tus. tional championship and when they

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won it in 1990. "But looking at the way they control the line of scrimmage and their

playmakers at the skilled positions, I'd have to give this team the nod over the others. Walden's squad dropped a 41-23 decision to Kansas, falling to 0-6 overall and 0-2 in the conference.

Despite losing to the Jayhawks, Walden said his team was improving.

"We executed better and got our quarterbacks back," he said. "Our offense did a good job executing against what I think is a pretty good defense. I like the system and the things we're trying to get done."
