This would be forgivable if the movie was funny, but the simplistic attempts at humor couldn't earn a chuckle from a laughing

The cast would be very well attuned to making a hilarious movie. Cage was a riot in "Raising Arizona," and both Lovitz and Carvey have displayed their immense comedic talents on the big screen.

But the mundane roles that they are given stifle any opportunity for humor.

The movie has one funny scene that will not be discussed in order that the poor souls who are forced to endure this big-screen trauma will have at least one respite for their
