Two wins are tune up for men's tennis team

In what Nebraska coach Kerry McDermott called the best performance of the season, the men's tennis team stunned Creighton 9-0 Friday. Southwest Missouri State fell victim to the Cornhuskers 5-2 earlier in the day.

The two wins doubled the amount of success that the Huskers scarcely found on their tour of Texas the week before. On the Texas trip, Nebraska won just one match of six.

"This was our strongest play of the year," McDermott said. "It will help build our confidence before we start conference play next week."

The Huskers' 9-0 sweep was their first shut-out of the season, and included an impressive 6-4, 7-5 win by No. 1 singles player Andy Davis over Creighton's Brian Keny. Davis was outsized and sometimes overpowered by the much-taller Keny, but never relinquished the lead during the 1 1/2-hour-long match.

Adrian Maizey dominated Luis Peon at the No. 3 singles position with a 6-0, 6-2 win. Maizey and Davis combined in the No. 1 doubles competition, winning 8-2.
