

# Road meets prepare gymnasts

Of the 11 meets in which the Nebraska men's gymnastics team has competed this season, only three have been held in the friendly confines of the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

The Cornhuskers have spent most of their time on the road, and Coach Francis Allen knows his scheduling has toughened up his young team.

"It has helped them," said Allen of Nebraska's five freshmen and two sophomores. "They are more comfortable."

At 7 p.m. Saturday at the Lloyd Noble Center in Norman, Okla., the Huskers will have a chance to show how much they have improved since January.

Third-ranked Nebraska is one of six teams, along with Stanford, New Mexico, Oklahoma, California and Brigham Young, to have qualified for the NCAA West Regional.

The top three teams will advance

to meet the top three teams from the NCAA East Regional at the NCAA Championship Meet, April 20-22, in Columbus, Ohio.

Each of the Huskers' five opponents in Norman on Saturday also competed at the Mountain Pacific Championships last week in Albuquerque, N.M.

Stanford, which finished second to Nebraska last year at the NCAA Championships, won the meet last week with a score of 229. Top-ranked New Mexico finished second, while the Huskers placed third.

"The thing with New Mexico and Stanford is you never know what to expect," said Nissen Award candidate Richard Grace, Nebraska's top all-arounder. "They could be on one day and blow us out of there, and the next day they could be off."

Grace said the regional meet would be a three-team race among Stanford, New Mexico and Nebraska.

"We've got the same talent potential," Grace said, "and whoever hits

wins." But a week ago at the regional preview, Nebraska didn't hit. The Huskers opened on the pommel horse, falling off four times.

"We started out in almost a two-point hole," Allen said. "No other team missed as much on one event as we did."

At regionals, Nebraska will begin on rings, which Grace said should be to the Huskers' advantage. Their goal, he said, is to start on a good note and continue to hit throughout the meet.

"If we go 6 for 6," Grace said, "there is no team that is going to touch us. We'll be No. 1 in regionals, and we'll have our ninth national championship."

The Huskers easily defeated Oklahoma at the Lloyd Noble Center Feb. 24.

"If these guys are going to go in there with the same attitude they had before," Allen said, "it's not going to be a contest."

In the bottom of the ninth, Shepherd led off the ninth with a base hit for the Huskers. Meyer — with two strikes on him — hit a pitch over the center field fence for his second home run of the day and a 12-10 Husker victory.

Sanders said that it was very important for his team to start winning close games.

"It's very big," Sanders said. "If we look back after this season's over, you'll see the close wins will make a big difference in our overall approach to where we are going."

Despite the blown save, Shepherd raised his record to 2-2. Robert Keens took the loss for the Jayhawks as his record fell to 1-2.

Nebraska was the beneficiary of strong starting pitching for the second straight game. Junior right-hander Craig Sanders pitched 5 1/3 innings, giving up five runs on eight hits while striking out three and walking two.

Raytown finished the season 27-1 after an 80-73 double-overtime loss to Kansas City Central in the Missouri state quarterfinals on March 4. Lue, 5-11 and 165 pounds, was recently named to All-Missouri first-team.

The Bluejays, who had no player taller than 6-2, were not expected to finish among the top teams in the state, said Lue, the team's only senior starter. But heading into the state playoffs, they found themselves undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the Kansas City area.

Shortly before Raytown's final game, Lue passed the ACT, becoming eligible to play next season. Once he was academically eligible, Lue said, he attracted a great deal of attention from schools that had previously shown little interest in him, including Arkansas and Memphis.

But Lue, who said he had talked to Florence on the phone about attending Nebraska next year, decided to stay true to his commitment. He said he chose Nebraska over Kansas State, Missouri, Oklahoma, Wichita State and Texas Tech.

"I liked Nebraska because they stayed with me the whole time," he said, "and because I would be able to play as a freshman."
