Flashy special effects can't save 'Kombat'

It's better than "Street Fighter,"

but that's not saying much.
Building a 90-minute movie from a video game experience would be difficult. But instead of just using the characters for a completely stupid plot line—as in "Street Fighter"—"Mortal Kombat" director Paul Anderson placed them in a setting similar to the video game itself.

And while "Street Fighter" was pushed into theaters to draw on the video game crowd and beat "Mortal Kombat" in the race to the screen, the move worked to "Kombat's" advan-

With the extra time, grade-A special effects were perfected, fight sequences were refined and (most importantly) space was put between the two movies.

Smart move. Still, "Mortal. Kombat" is not without its drawbacks.

Any film headlining Christopher Lambert is asking for trouble. Lambert's earlier works ("High-lander," "Subway") are unfortunately overshadowed by his more recent and numerous — escapades into the Hall of Films Not Worth Crap ("The Hunted," "Highlander III"). But Anderson did one smart thing with Lambert this time around: very little dialogue or screen time.

Lambert plays the Thunder God Rayden (in the video game it's spelled R-A-I-D-E-N), who has come to Earth to protect three mortals - Johnny Cage, Sonya Blade and Liu Kangas they prepare to enter the Mortal Kombat arena.

Hopefully, the sequel (which is GREATLY hinted at) will go for more action and less acting.
