crime," Jansen said at a news conference at Omaha police headquarters.

Jansen would not say whether investigators suspected that all seven had been in the van that Wilson stopped a few miles northwest of Omaha. He said the accessory charge could indicate some involvement other than being at the scene of the shooting.

Police Chief Jim Skinner refused to discuss any details of the case because of the continuing investigation.

"I'm not shocked anymore when it comes to ficer James Wilson Sr., said he wanted only juveniles and their involvement in violent justice for whoever killed his son — not re-

venge.
"My family, although I have no love for the individuals who took the life of my son, we harbor no animosity," James Wilson said Tuesday. "We don't want revenge. Like any other

victim, you just want justice."

The elder Wilson pinned a badge on his son during his son's swearing-in ceremony just over a year ago.







