Physicist considers time travel possible

LONDON (AP) — Physicist Stephen Hawking, who once doubted people could ever travel through time, now seems to be backtracking.

Hawking's forward to a new book, "The Physics of Star Trek" by Lawrence Krauss, indicates he has reconsidered, The Sunday Times reported.

"One of the consequences of rapid interstellar travel would be that one could also travel backward in time," Hawking is quoted as saying.

"If you combine Einstein's general theory of relativity with quantum theory, it does begin to seem a possi-

bility," he was quoted as saying Saturday.

Hawking, Lucasian professor of mathematics at Cambridge University, is the author of the international best-seller "A Brief History of Time."

Dorn rescues spinoff from 'Deep' depths

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Michael Dorn, who played the Klingon Lt. Cmdr. Wolf on "Star Trek: The Next Generation," has been called in to keep "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine" from disappearing into a wormhole.

The spinoff sci-fi series has slipped in the ratings since its 1993 premiere in syndication.

For Dorn, it means 70 minutes of makeup every morning. "Actually, I had to weigh the thing with the makeup and also with what they were giving me," Dorn said. "And what they were offering far outweighed the makeup, or else I would not have done it."

One 'I do' not enough for 'Baywatch' star

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Baywatch" star Pamela Anderson wants to make a habit of getting married to rocker Tommy Lee.

"We've been married twice already and we want to get married again in Venice, Italy, possibly on New Year's Eve or New Year's Day," Anderson said in an "Extra" TV show interview for broadcast today.

Earlier this year, the couple married on a beach in Mexico and recited vows again during a private ceremony in Hawaii.

"We just want to get married everywhere, and eventually my mom will be able to come. She hasn't been to either one yet, and neither has Tommy's family. It's just kind of whoever's there," she said.

"We just kind of think of it at the last minute and get married."

Oprah may become first black billionaire

NEW YORK (AP) — It may soon be Oprah with nine '0s.

In Forbes magazine's 1995 list of the 400 richest Americans, Oprah Winfrey stands at No. 399. Although she has a considerable way to go, she's en route to becoming America's first black billionaire, the magazine said in its Oct. 16 issue, released Sunday.

Microsoft Corp. Chairman Bill Gates held the top spot with about \$14.8 billion in assets, while Omaha investor Warren Buffet was listed at No. 2, with roughly \$11.8 billion.

Winfrey, the only entertainer on the annual list, is worth about \$340 million. The 41-year-old Chicagoan owns her top-rated talk show and production company, Harpo (Oprah spelled backwards), and holds a stake in the show's distributor, King World Productions Inc.

Winfrey's coffers will continue to grow as she benefits from five-year deals for "The Oprah Winfrey Show" signed last year with 210 television stations, plus a six-film commitment from ABC and King World stock options. She also plans to become a Hollywood producer.

Street named after country music legend

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — He's traveled a bumpy road to get to George Jones Place.

The country music star, whose problems with alcohol and drugs have often made him a concert no-show, got a warm welcome home Sunday, when part of a Beaumont street was named in his honor.

Hundreds of fans watched the mayor present Jones, 64, a proclamation and a street sign in front of the Jefferson Theater, where he first performed 51 years ago.

"It's such a sentimental thing," Jones said. "It means more to me really than all the other things, except the hits."

Among his best-known songs on his more than 150 albums are "He Stopped Loving Her Today" and "The
