Editorial errors

This letter is addressed to the author of the Oct. 24 editorial in the Daily Nebraskan.

We are part of the UNL undergraduate/graduate program currently preparing for a model United Nations conference in Chicago which simulates the workings of the UN.

At this conference, UNL represents the nations of Brazil and Yemen. In this endeavor, we have built a strong working knowledge of the current state of the United Nations and its projects. Some of the points you make about the United Nations are accurate, and we agree with your stance that there are problems with the United Nations, including the duplication of roles and corruption within the Secretariat.

However, one of your paragraphs is patently wrong.

You state that there are five members of the Security Council and that they can veto any U.N. resolution. There are, in fact, fifteen members of the Security Council, with the five you mentioned (China, France, the Russian Federation, the United Kingdom and the United States) holding permanent seats and veto power over Security Council Resolutions

Furthermore, the Security Council holds no direct power over the resolutions passed by the committees of the General Assembly or over those of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), both of which have passed many resolutions the United States did not agree with.

You state that there are challenges ahead for the U.N. in the next 50 years — apparently education about its function and makeup should be added to your
