Volleyball team defeats ISU, intimidates with strong defense

Tough defense and another strong performance from senior middle blocker Allison Weston helped the top-ranked Nebraska volleyball team defeat Iowa State Saturday night at the NU Coliseum.

With the 15-3, 15-5, 15-9 win, the Huskers improved to 19-1 on the season and ran their consecutive win streak to 18 matches. The Huskers have not lost a game since Aug. 26 to Stanford and have held the No. 1 spot for seven straight weeks.

The Husker defense kept Iowa State's outside hitters in check, holding them to a .102 hitting percentage, while holding their top outside hitter, senior Kirstin Hugdahl, to a -.080

Junior middle blocker Jen McFadden said the defense stepped up.

"I thought we had a lot of good rallies. Defense is really the key to our game," McFadden said. "If we can keep the balls at the floor and get the ball to Christy (Johnson) consistently, then we're a great ball team."

Coach Terry Pettit said that Iowa State was intimidated by Nebraska's size and strength.

"I don't think Iowa State competed like they normally would in the first couple of games," he said. "Offense comes and goes, but defense keeps

you in the matches.

"We know we can attack with anybody; that's not the issue for us, the issue is to play better defense, so we did a better job there."

Specifically, Pettit said that senior outside hitter Kate Crnich, McFadden, freshman outside hitter Fiona Nepo and junior outside hitter Maria Hedbeck were impressive defensively.

The Huskers now begin a stretch of six matches in 15 days when they face Kansas State Wednesday at the Coliseum. After that the Huskers travel to Austin, Texas, on Nov. 4 to face eighth-ranked Texas.

Huskers run hard in Big 8 tourney

The Nebraska women's cross country team finished fourth at the Big Eight Championships, while the men placed sixth at Lawrence, Kan.

Sophomore Nora Shepherd led the Huskers with her sixth-place finish and a time of 18 minutes, 14 seconds. Colorado won on the women's side.

Oklahoma State won the men's team race with 38 points. Nebraska senior Brady Bonsall finished 12th to lead the Huskers.

The women defeated Southern Illinois Saturday at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. No. 9 Nebraska won the first seven events and 11 of 16 events for a 191-125 victory over the Salukis.

Husker senior Melanie Dodd, a two-time All-American, won the 50, 100 and 200 freestyles. Jane Glazebrook, a three-time All-American, won both the 100 and 200 backstroke.

"We had some really good swims all the way across the board today," Nebraska coach Cal Bentz said, "considering it was the first collegiate meet of the season."

"This may be the best we've ever swam this early in the season."

The men's team, ranked 24th, defeated Southern Illinois 150-92. Ne-

braska controlled the meet from the start as David Foster, Adrian Costello, Francois Boshoff and Juan Benavides won the opening 200 medley relay.

Men's tennis

The Nebraska men's tennis team picked up only one first-round win at the Rolex Region V Championship Saturday at Wichita, Kan.

Cornhusker freshman Roshan Fernando defeated Gianfranco Castellano of Southwest Missouri State 6-3, 1-6, 7-6 in the first round. But in round two, Fernando was defeated in straight sets by Evansville's Nick Turner.

The Jordan mania didn't end there, though. When the Bulls' bus left the arena, a crowd of fans chased after the bus in front of the arena on Court Street.

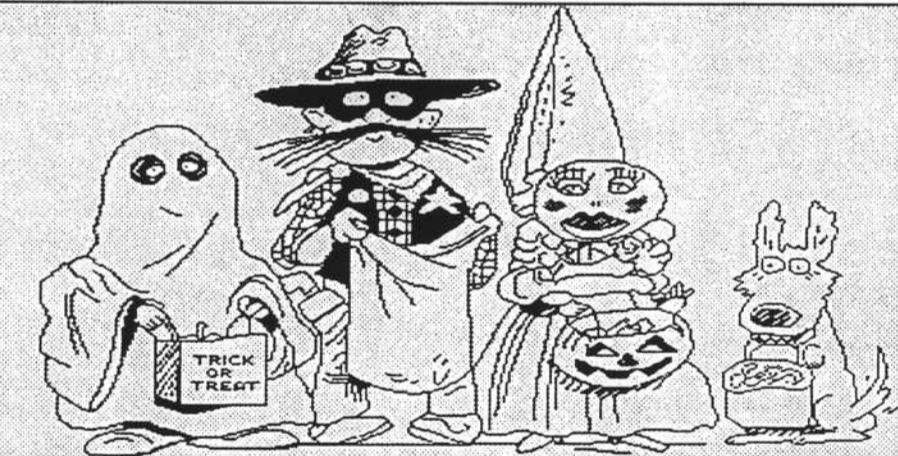
Besides Jordan and Piatkowski, the fans also took a liking to Dennis Rodman, who was thrown out of the game in the third quarter.
