Tenopir praises line's ability

In 22 years as Nebraska's offensive line coach, Milt Tenopir has tried to stay away from putting labels on past Cornhusker squads — including last season's offensive line that some touted as Nebraska's best ever.

Last season's line included Outland Trophy winner Zach Wiegert, first-team All-American Brenden Stai, co-captain Rob Zatechka and Joel Wilks. This season's line is just as good.

"(Last year's line) is no different than the last 21 or 22 lines we have worked with," Tenopir said. "I've never compared a line. But these kids felt like (last year's line) wasn't that special; they were their backups. When they got in, they did just as well. That's kind of the attitude they had."

"But these kids have been fun to work with because they weren't expected to do or have the accomplishments of that bunch last year. They are

very athletic, they are mobile and they play with a lot of pride."

Tenopir said he had been pleased with the Huskers' concentration level this season. The line hasn't allowed a quarterback sack in nine games.

"That means we've got a bunch of people that are really concentrating," Tenopir said. "These kids have shown a great deal of poise, and it really hasn't made a lot of difference what the situation was, whether it was the team they're playing or a team where they have to fight their tail off to win."

The Huskers are trying to have flawless execution throughout the whole game, Tenopir said, but they have not been able to accomplish that goal this season.

Nebraska played well against Iowa State, but penalties kept the Huskers from being perfect.

Tenopir said he had wished Nebraska had scored in the fourth quarter, which would have given Nebraska

80 points for the day. During the fourth-quarter drive, the Huskers were hindered by a clipping penalty, and then a fourth-down pass from quarterback Brook Berringer to Jeff Lake fell incomplete.

"It would have been exceptional if we had made that one more touchdown, we would have scored every single possession in that ball game," Tenopir said.

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did to land a head coaching job, said the head coaching vacancy at Iowa State in 1995 was similar to the situation at Kansas State when Snyder took the job in 1989.

"It's one of those jobs that are supposed to be a dead-end one," McCarney said.

Kansas State, 8-1, was rewarded for two consecutive routs over Kansas and Oklahoma with a No. 7 ranking, its highest ever.

Snyder said he knew McCarney

too well to let Kansas State take the 3-6 Cyclones lightly Saturday.

"Dan is an extremely fine football coach," Snyder said.

Snyder said McCarney found out what a devastating blow Nebraska could be to a program after the Cornhuskers routed the Cyclones 73-14 Saturday.

"But Nebraska has a way of doing that to you," Snyder said, referring to the Wildcats' 49-25 loss to Nebraska.

In this decade, Colorado has dominated Big Eight women's basketball. The Buffaloes have finished in the top three of the conference every year since 1988.

If the Buffaloes do stampede to the title, it will not be a runaway. The conference will be deep in experience and talent this year, returning one first-team and three second-team All-Big Eight performers.

One such athlete is Kansas senior

guard Charisse Sampson, who will headline a group of four returning starters for Jayhawk coach Marian Washington.

The Jayhawks lost guard Angela Aycoc to graduation, but Sampson and juniors Tamecka Dixon and Angie Hartlieb figure to fill the void left by the All-American.

The only returning first-team all-conference player is senior guard Stacey Coffey of Oklahoma State, a three-time selection. Senior forward Erika Martin of Missouri and guard Pam Pennon of Oklahoma round out the returning all-conference performers.

Phillips

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
He scored his first touchdown since scoring on a 50-yard jaunt against the Spartans.

In Phillips' absence, freshman Ahman Green has emerged as Nebraska's starting I-back, and Phillips said that's where Green should stay. Green is three yards shy of 1,000 yards, and against Iowa State, he broke the Nebraska record for rushing yards as a freshman.

"If I deserve it, then I care if I get it back," Phillips said. "But after today, that was a very average performance, so I think Ahman deserves the starting spot."

Osborne said Phillips' effort Saturday probably wouldn't propel him over Green, but it may drop him behind I-back Clinton Childs to third string.

"We gave him enough playing time to see where he stood, and we'll have to assess it," Osborne said. "I told him from day one, 'If you're going to play again, you're going to have to earn your spot.'"



