# Moore ready to ruin NU season

Beating Nebraska won't make Oklahoma's season or make up for the Sooners' 5-4-1 record, but it would give junior halfback Jerald Moore a little satisfaction.

"We've had a bad season, but this won't make our season," Moore said. "We will feel better about our season if we can make someone else's season as bad as ours because we won't feel as bad then. If we beat Nebraska, I'm pretty sure that will make them feel bad about their season."

The last two years, Moore and the Sooners had that opportunity. The Sooners twice failed to ruin Nebraska's undefeated record.

They'll get another try on Friday at Memorial Stadium.

Besides a shot at ruining Nebraska's season, the game also gives Moore an opportunity to gain 1,000 yards rushing this season.

Although Moore had to sit out the Iowa State game with a toe injury, he still leads the Oklahoma rushing attack averaging 106.9 yards a game and 6.4 yards a carry. He only needs 38 yards to surpass the 1,000-yard mark.

Moore said he would wait until the end of the season before he decided on returning to Oklahoma next season or declaring himself eligible for the National Football League draft.

But Moore has his eyes set on the Sooner offense as a whole. For the Sooners to defeat Nebraska, Oklahoma's offense needs to be successful.

"We need to have a ball control offense, and we have to keep the ball away from their offense," Moore said. "We need to keep our defense off the field, and we can't go three downs and out."

Oklahoma's offensive success, Moore said, depends on being able to preserve a lead late in the game and on executing through all phases of the game.

But too often the Sooners have sputtered this year. Moore said the low point came on Nov. 11, when they were shut out by Oklahoma State. The Cowboys defeated Oklahoma 12-0 for the Sooners' first shutout loss since 1983.

Although Moore said he hadn't been able to find any flaws in either the Nebraska offense or defense, the Sooners do have an advantage over the Huskers.

## Basketball team prepares for Hawaiian challenge

A week in Hawaii may be just what the Nebraska basketball team needs to get ready for the upcoming season.

The Cornhuskers arrived in Hilo, Hawaii, on Friday to begin preparations for the Big Island Invitational. Coach Danny Nee planned to practice seven times in Hilo before Friday's season opener against Toledo.

For one Husker senior, this weekend will mark the beginning of the end. Senior guard Erick Strickland—along with Jaron Boone, Terrance Badgett, Jason Glock, Chris Sallee and Tom Wald—will finish up their careers this season.

"It flew by kind of quick," Strickland said, "but I'm happy with my career here at Nebraska. I'm not happy it's about over. I hope to go out with a bang and be successful in my final year."

The Huskers and Toledo will be two of eight teams participating in the

invitational. Wichita State, Utah State, Minnesota, Valparaiso, Oregon and Hawaii-Hilo round out the invite. Both Minnesota and Oregon played in last year's NCAA Tournament.

This year's Husker squad will be one filled with youth, Strickland said, and this weekend will be an early test of the team's chemistry.

"We've been working real hard as a team," Strickland said. "We still have quite a few things that have to gel; we've still got a lot of young guys."

One test for the Huskers will be freshman point guard Tyronn Lue. Strickland said Lue's defense would be a great addition to the team.

"Tyronn really gets after you defensively," he said. "He really gets after the point guard. He's become quite a floor leader. He knows when to slow it down. That helps us also."

The Huskers will take on Toledo at 6:15 Friday night. Toledo finished 1994 with a 16-11; the Huskers finished 18-14.
