The undefeated Nebraska basketball team will attempt to win its seventh straight game Saturday at 6 p.m. against Minnesota.

This will be the second meeting between the two teams this season. Nebraska beat Minnesota 96-85 in the championship game of the Big Island Invitational Nov. 26.

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"Obviously, he's meant a lot for our program," Coach Tom Osborne said. "If I were to choose one player that has had the most impact on the greatest number of games over the longest period of time since I've been at Nebraska, it would be Tommie Frazier. He's started for four years, and he does so many different things that can affect the outcome of a game.

"It might be a run. It might be a pass. Or it might just be a decision. He's a great competitor and, one way or another, he's going to fig-ure out how to get it done."

This season, Frazier accounted for 31 touchdowns (17 passing, 14 rushing), averaged 178 yards a game in total offense and has a 156 passing efficiency rating (second in the Big Eight).

But Frazier, who also has 1,362 passing yards and 604 rushing yards, said he didn't know if his versatility was enough to win him the Heisman.

"I don't think anything is mine," he said. "It's up to other people to vote for me. I can't say that it's mine when I have no idea what people are thinking about. I think it's going to be a close race. I feel I have a good chance."

While Frazier — 32-3 as a starter has the career consistency in his favor, Wuerffel has posted huge numbers this season.

Wuerffel, a junior, leads the nation in passing efficiency rating (178) and touchdowns (35). He has thrown for 3,266 yards this season, and his efficiency rating is the bestever by a Division I-A quarterback.

Five candidates - Frazier, Wuerffel, Ohio State's Eddie George, Iowa State's Troy Davis and Darnell Autry of Northwestern will be present for the Heisman Trophy festivities and presentation.

If Frazier wins the award, he will win it for the entire team, according to his teammates.

"It's real important to us," split end Brendan Holbein said. "It's not just for him, but for the whole program. He represents all of us. We feel like we're part it. We'll all be gathered around the TV that night because we know if he wins it, we've helped him do it."

Coach Beck expects improvement, pressure

As the Nebraska women's basketball team comes off a win over Kent State on Wednesday, Coach Angela Beck said her team was looking toward improving rather than changing the scheme for its upcoming game against Michigan.

"I can't say we are going to change things; we're going to get better at some things," she said. "Mainly, our post-up game and in-side opportunities for our guards."

Nebraska will play Michigan at 7:30 Friday night at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. Michigan comes in 4-1 on the year after a disappointing 8-19 season last year. One of those losses included a 99-81 loss to Nebraska. Overall, the Huskers lead the series 3-0 over the Wolverines.

"They're looking to rebound off last year," Beck said, "They had a lot of freshmen last year, and they have a good interior game with (sophomore forward Tiffany) Willard and (sophomore center Pollyanna) Johns. They like to pound it in there."

Besides the interior game, Michigan likes to play an up-tempo game with a run-'n'-gun type offense, and pressure the ball a lot, Beck said.

"They do a good job of pres-sure," she said. "I expect 94 feet of corner to corner type basketball."

After the 80-71 win over Kent State, Beck said her team needed to concentrate on a couple of key areas. One of those areas, turnovers, has plagued the team for the first part of the season.

We need to establish a limited turnover ratio," Beck said.

Nebraska committed 29 turnovers against Kent State, and had 26 turnovers in an 89-65 final game loss to Oregon State in the Gazette Times Classic last weekend.

Beck said that she saw a lot of improvement on the team, but certain players had stepped up. Senior center Pyra Aarden, junior forward Tina McClain, and sophomore guard Anna DeForge were key players whom Beck mentioned. But the Huskers don't rely on those three players exclusively, Beck said.

Rather, Beck sees the bench play for the Huskers as a main factor in their success.

"It's not a singular player; everyone seems to be contributing."
