damaged aircraft, has been refurbishing the capsule off and on since the fall, Garrett said.

Painting is complete on the top half of the 14-by-20 foot capsule, he said. Apollo 009 has been painted white, the capsule's original color, he said.


"We'll return it to the way it was when it blasted off," he said. Apollo 009 was launched by a Sat-

urn 1b rocket on Feb. 26, 1966, for a 37-minute flight.

Before completing the painting, Garrett said, the capsule had to be sanded and primed. The primer makes the paint stick smoothly to the surface, he said.

The bottom of the capsule has been sanded, Garrett said, and is still waiting the primer and paint.

The hardest part of restoring the





capsule has been sanding its surface, Garrett said.

"The overall preparation of the exterior surface has been hard," he said. "It's all manual labor that has to be sanded down to bare material." So far, Howe said, the hard work

has paid off.

'It's absolutely magnificent," he said. "The surface of it looks like a fine china plate. The people at Duncan have done a fantastic job."

Cauble said.

To ensure security, each locker requires two keys to open. One is given to the gun owner, and one is held by the supervisor on duty. Only Cauble has a master key to open every locker.

The on-duty supervisor records each time a gun is checked in and out. Police have the right to deny owners access to their guns if they are noticeably intoxicated. "If someone comes in and was up-

set and talking about a certain professor or something, we might sit them down and discuss it," Cauble said, laughing.
