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St. Louis satisfies **Phillips**

The opportunity to play in the National Football League and move on with his life has made former Nebraska I-back Lawrence Phillips a

But until he receives a contract with the St. Louis Rams, he isn't excited.

The Rams' first-round pick and the sixth overall selection in the April 20 draft is expected to receive a signing bonus of \$7 million to \$8 million.

"I really haven't got too excited yet," Phillips said Friday in a teleconference interview from St. Louis. "Since I don't have the money, I'm not excited about it."

Phillips doesn't expect any problem in negotiating a contract with the Rams. Since the draft, Phillips has been in St. Louis working out with the Rams and learning their offense.

When he does receive his contract, Phillips said he planned to establish some boys' homes similar to the one in which he was raised in West Covina,

Although he was disappointed about not being drafted higher, Phillips said he was pleased to get the chance to play for the Rams.

The New York Jets, Jacksonville Jaguars, Arizona Cardinals, Baltimore Ravens and New York Giants had the first five selections in the draft, but all passed on Phillips, many because of his off-the-field problems.

Phillips was considered by most scouts to be the best player available in the draft. But his stock dropped when he was convicted of assaulting his exgirlfriend in September.

Before the draft, Phillips said he thought he was going to be taken by Jacksonsville, which held the second pick behind the Jets.

"I was pretty surprised when I wasn't drafted by them," Phillips said. "We play themnext year, and I'll get to show them what they missed out on.

"I have talked to some of those teams, and most have said they were sorry or needed a linebacker or some other position more than a running

Nebraska's Nicola Martial won the university division triple jump with a leap of 42 feet, 8 3/4 inches Friday at the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa.

Also on Friday, Nebraska's 4 x 800-meter relay team of Eric Mickelson, Jonah Kiptarus, Alex Lamme and Balazs Tolgyesi won with a time of 7 minutes, 22.68 seconds.

Two other Cornhusker athletes won titles at the relays, which drew a two-day crowd of more than 34,000. Takisha Lewis won the long jump with a jump of 20-11 3/4, and shot putter Paulette Mitchell's NCAA automatic qualifying throw of 55 feet was good for first place.

The 1,600-meter relay team of Charlene Plummer, LaTisha Croom, Kathy Miiller and Jill Myatt placed second with a time of 3:36.17. Tressa Thompson was fourth in the discus with a throw of mel horse with a 9.825. 159 feet 8 inches. Tom Fish finished fifth in the 100-meter dash at 10.65 seconds and fifth in the 200meter dash with a time of 21.46

Hammer thrower Greg Armitage was sixth with a throw of 193 feet 11 inches, and Benji Prebyl finished sixth in the triple jump with a leap of 49 feet, 9 1/4 inches.

in Philadelphia, Nebraska hurdler Miklos Roth recorded an NCAA provisional time of 50.51 seconds, earning second place in the 400meter hurdles. Frank Mensah (51.77 seconds) placed seventh and Willie Hibler (51.96 seconds) took 11th place in the same event. In the 110-

meter high hurdles, Hibler's time of 13.81 seconds earned him fourthplace honors.

Nebraska's 4 x 110-meter shuttle-hurdle relay team of Hilber, Roth, Mensah and Charles Reidwhich was hoping to set a world record — was disqualified.
