Phillips shows signs of future stardom

KANSAS CITY, Mo. - After being selected No. 6 overall in the 1996 National Football League draft by the St. Louis Rams, former Nebraska running back Lawrence Phillips now must prove he can perform in the NFL -

or he won't get paid.

Phillips held out of the Rams' training camp for 16 days before signing a \$5.6 million contract with no signing

In his first extensive NFL action on Aug. 3, Phillips ran for 37 yards and was particularly impressive on a 3-yard touchdown run, avoiding a tackle in the backfield before speeding into the end zone
