





Blowout shocks

K-State players

MANHATTAN, Kan. - Kansas State's scoreboard operator and statisticians might as well have taken Saturday off.

No statistics or score were needed after KSU's game with Nebraska, because after the Cornhuskers' 39-3 dismantling of the Wildcats, it was completely obvious who the better team was in this supposed battle between the elite of the Big 12's North Division.

"We went out and got whooped today like I didn't think this team could get whooped," Kansas State quarterick Brian Kavanagh said.

Saturday's whooping, Nebraska's 28th-straight victory over the Wildcats, did little to please Kansas State Coach Bill Snyder.

"It's pretty obvious what took place," Snyder said. "Nebraska played great against us on defense, and our

offense wasn't very good."

Whether it was Kansas State's offense or Nebraska's defense, the Wildcats were able to produce just 86 yards of offense, 68 of which came in the

"We sure helped them today," Snyder said. "But they are a very good defensive football team. I think they have proven that time and time again.

"Even with the loss at Arizona State, they played extremely well, and only gave up one touchdown. They're a very good defensive football team."

Snyder said he thought the Wildcats would be able to make a come-

back in the second half.

ished on the third play of the second half. Nebraska I-back DeAngelo Evans found a seam and squirted down the sideline 69 yards to give the Huskers a 25-3 lead.

Wildcat cornerback Chris Canty, an All-American who had five tackles, said Evans' run ruined Kansas State's hope for an upset.

"That run pretty much broke our backs," Canty said. "It just killed ev-

erything pretty much."

Twice in the first quarter, the Nebraska offense took over on its own side of the field, but KSU held the

Huskers to a pair of field goals.

Kansas State was without the services of Defensive Coordinator Bob Cope. Cope, 59, has been hospitalized

and in a coma since he passed out
Tuesday. He suffers from cancer.

The absence of Cope didn't contribute to the Wildcats' downfall,
Snyder said, but the players and
coaches have been thinking of him all
