The end result is a computerized physics classroom.

Students can use the computers to gather information on the World Wide Web, conduct research with electronic sensors, instantly plot experiment results and download unfinished assignments to their own personal computers.

In addition, all exams will be

given on computers.

Fuller said he knows of no other universities with this kind of phys-

"We think it's unique," Fuller said. "There are other institutions that do distance homework, but we don't know of any place where students are doing assignments, homework and exams solely on comput-

Fuller said this setup might become typical of all classrooms in the

"It seems clear to me that this will be the way of the future," Fuller

"Imagine a classroom where all the students come in with laptop computers and take notes by typing what the lecturer says.

"Sooner or later the professor will realize that there's got to be a better way to get out the information than by projecting it on a wall."


