Snow's lush orchestrations, chock full of eerie strings, hollow synthesizers and noises that can't be explained, fill any episode, but they also stand

While Snow's soundscapes can be called music, they almost evolve beyond that. Each track breathes with a haunting life of its own.

Some tracks embody fear, others hate. Different tracks capture the sense of being alone in the world, others the sense of despair. All, however, always contain the backdrop of the conspiracy.

That's what this is, really. A soundtrack to a conspiracy.

"The Truth and the Light" is a successful experiment in shaping sound into a solid form, something tangible that's almost real enough to scare the life out of someone.

Listen to it with the lights off, because the truth is out there.
