Bombs ruin abortion clinic, injure 6

Police tighten security at other area clinics.

ATLANTA — Two bomb blasts an hour apart rocked a building containing an abortion clinic Thursday, injuring six people who had rushed to the scene of the first explosion, including federal agents, rescue workers and a TV cameraman.

"The second explosion is clearly designed to maim and hurt those who were coming to assist," said Mayor Bill Campbell. "So we're dealing with a warped mind here."

The explosions left the Atlanta Northside Family Planning Services clinic in ruins and blew out windows across the street. Police immediately tightened security at all other clinics in the city.

President Clinton condemned the explosions as "a vile and malevolent act."

"Make no mistake: Anyone who brings violence against a woman trying to exercise her constitutional rights is committing an act of terror," he said.

The first bomb went off at 9:30 a.m. near the clinic on the ground floor of a three-story office building that also houses lawyers, dentists and other professionals. The second bomb went off near a trash bin in the parking lot.

A crowd of investigators, police, journalists and bystanders who had gathered outside after the first explosion heard a loud boom and felt the concussion. They could see a bright flash and debris flying in the air.

Ralph Reed, director of the Christian Coalition, also condemned the bombing in a statement faxed to news media:

"It is imperative that we seek through the legislative process to protect innocent human life. Episodes such as today's violence only serve to undermine those efforts. We will continue to speak out on behalf of the unborn, but we will do so with the godly weapons of love and mercy, and not with the hellish weapons of violence and terror."

Israeli troops pull out of Hebron

HEBRON, West Bank — As Palestinians here cheered, Israeli soldiers loaded dozens of trucks, lowered their Star of David flag and left.

Israel's parliament gave final approval Friday to an accord ending their country's 30-year rule in Hebron.

In heavy rain and fog, army bulldozers dismantled cement barriers at the gate of Israel's main military headquarters on a hill above the city. Soldiers folded large olive drab tents and piled furniture, communications equipment and water tanks into the trucks. A Palestinian crowd cheered and

waved victory signs each time an Israeli jeep or truck pulled away. A long line of Palestinian police jeeps waited outside the compound for the official handover of control.

The base will become the headquarters of Yasser Arafat's 400-member security force after Israel's parliament approves the handover of 80 percent of the city of 130,000 Palestinians and 500 Jews.

Israel's parliament approved the withdrawal Friday by an 87-17 vote. The vote followed an all-day debate that saw Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu under attack from members

of his own Likud party, who feel betrayed by his consent to a peace process he once attacked.

"What's the difference between us and Labor?" demanded legislator Uzi Landau. "What will we tell our voters?"

"We have no say in anything," another legislator, Reuven Rivlin, complained. "What will we do if the Palestinians declare a state?"

Foreign Minister David Levy, who has often clashed sharply with Netanyahu in the past, came strongly to his defense today.

"What is the alternative?" Levy shouted at the hecklers. "There is no alternative. The only alternative you can give is stalemate."

English, not ebonics, to be taught in Oakland

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — School officials here made it clear Wednesday they will teach standard English instead of ebonics.

The seven-member school board passed the revisions unanimously, a month after starting a national debate by declaring black English a second language.

Policy revisions drop any suggestion that ebonics — a combination of "ebony" and "phonics" — is genetically based, and cut wording that implies students would be taught in both ebonics and standard English.

Those phrases had been sharply criticized in Oakland and nationwide by critics who said the board was legitimizing slang and lowering standards for black students.

Oakland officials insisted they were not backing down from their original intention to train teachers to recognize

black English so they can help students make the transition to standard English.

Black English is classified as a social dialect by the American Speech, Language and Hearing Association. Its earmarks include unconjugated use of the verb "to be," as in, "He be sad," and multiple negatives, as in, "Didn't nobody see nothing."

At the heart of the debate over the school board's original resolution, passed Dec. 18, has been its assertion that black English is a separate language. The proposed revisions do not abandon that idea.

The original resolution declared that "African Language Systems are genetically based and not a dialect of English." The revised version states, "African Language Systems have origins in west (African) and Niger-Congo languages and are not merely dialects of English."

Raytheon to buy Hughes defense unit

NEW YORK (AP) — Raytheon Co., maker of the Patriot missile, won the bidding Thursday to buy the defense operations of Hughes Electronics from General Motors Corp. in a \$9.5 billion deal.

The combination would create the nation's third-largest defense contractor, behind Boeing Co. and Lockheed Martin Corp.

The deal, the most recent combination in the fast-consolidating defense industry, represents a setback for Northrop Grumman Corp., which was also a bidder for the Hughes unit.

The Hughes defense unit builds missiles, radar and heat-imaging systems and employs 40,000 people.

The combined company will be called Raytheon Co. and will have revenue of about \$21 billion a year.
