The Cornhuskers (11-4) travel north to take on Michigan State and Central Michigan Sunday at East Lansing, Mich.

With its victory over seventh-ranked ISU, No. 10 Nebraska broke into the top 10 for the first time.

NU starts off against the 13thranked Spartans at 1 p.m., and follow with the dual against Central Michigan at 7 p.m. The last time Nebraska saw Michigan State, the Spartans placed fifth at the Cliff Keen National Duals in Lincoln.

Nebraska Assistant Coach Mark Cody said the Huskers don't match up well with the Spartans.
