## 'Hoodlum' doesn't reach potential

## Solid cast, plot can't save poorly directed crime flick

You know, "Hoodlum" had the potential to be a great film. It has a bunch of great actors, a fascinating theme, a great story and a powerful message. With all of this, it's a tough thing to see how director Bill Duke botched this one up so badly.

The story is adapted from the true tale of Ellsworth "Bumpy" Johnson (Laurence Fishburne), an ex-con who goes back to the criminal underworld to help protect the only family he's ever known - a crime boss known as the Queen - from an encroaching opponent mobster, Dutch Schultz

Over the course of the story, the Queen is imprisoned, and the operation is turned over to Johnson, who eventually becomes corrupted by the power as the war rises between him and Schultz. Throughout the ordeal, Lucky Luciano, the crime boss of New York, tries to play both sides and pick the winner.


To their credit, Fishburne, Roth and Garcia put on outstanding performances. Fishburne's descent from Robin Hood to hoodlum is a veritable tour-deforce, almost on par with his performance in "Othello." Roth's twitchy gangster comes across as Christopher Walken on 12 pots of coffee. Garcia's tranquillity helps round out the mix of notorious underworld figures.
