

## 'Natural highs' to be promoted on East Campus

A new bulletin board on the Nebraska East Union will promote more informed student choices concerning the use of alcohol and other drugs. The "Natural High" display was approved by the Union Board at its bimonthly meeting Tuesday evening.

Presented by Kara Pfingston of Campus Recreation, the new bulletin board will show displays provided by the National Intramural-Recreational Sports Program (NIRSA), and any other displays promoting more responsible use of alcohol among college students.

Events like Alcohol Awareness Week, Fitness and Nutrition Month and the annual Spring Health Fair can be advertised on the board.

"A lot of students make choices about alcohol based on perceptions," said Pfingston, assistant director for East Campus recreation. "A change in perception can result in a change in behavior."

A "Natural High" bulletin board has already been installed in the Lee and Helene Sapp Campus Recreation Center, but there was a void on East Campus, so a 4x5 board will be installed in the lobby of the east union.

The board voted unanimously to approve the installation.

In other business:

Union Board President Saad Alavi and Secretary Matt Leuth were appointed representatives to the Diversity Retreat, which will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Louisville.

Representatives from various student organizations attend the event and discuss issues concerning overcoming the ethnic differences present on cam-

"It's bringing students from different backgrounds together," Alavi said, "and finding different ways to bridge the gap."

Also, Union Board Director Daryl Swanson said that construction of the city union was back on schedule. Minor problems with the soil content of the site were also mentioned, but are "very routine," Swanson said.

Swanson also gave an update on the construction of a new snack bar located in the recently constructed parking garage, one similar to the City Union's bakery. The snack bar is due to open next semester.

The board's next meeting will be in two weeks, and will include an open forum presentation by the National Bank of Commerce.
