NU is coming off consecutive losses to Purdue and Iowa State.

This weekend, both the men's and women's teams host Minnesota and Texas A&M. The triangular, which starts at 6:30 tonight and 10:30 a.m. Saturday, will be held at the Bob Devaney Sports Center Pool. "We are in a good spot moving on from last week," NU Swimming

Coach Cal Bentz said. "Everyone is looking good for a final run to the Big 12 and NCAA championships

The Aggies and Gophers might be exactly what the Huskers need to find out where they are for the stretch run. The A&M men's team is ranked 20th in the nation, and the Aggie women's team is 25th.

The Minnesota women's team, which is ranked 10th, is the highest-ranked team the Husker women have faced since competing against third-ranked Southern Methodist on Nov.

Bentz said facing high-ranked teams at this point in the season will help as the taper process begins.
