"China pays special attention to food," Zheng said. "Usually, at that time, parents prepare 10 different kinds of food."

CSSA members, their friends and their families devoted countless hours to preparing a traditionally elaborate celebration, Zheng said.

When one group member, a doctoral candidate, didn't have time to contribute to the event's planning, his wife, Ying Feng, stepped in to direct the evening's entertainment.

"Even in my dreams, I'm still thinking how to run this party well," Feng said.

Derrel Martin, UNL professor of biological systems engineering, said he attended the celebration after a graduate student working with him, who is from Beijing, invited him.

Throughout the night, Martin laughed and shared in the celebration as his student translated various parts of the program.

"I think it is very interesting to see different peoples' culture," Martin said. "I think it is very interesting to see what other people think.

Like Martin, many people from non-Chinese backgrounds joined in the New Year's festivities, and CSSA received many compliments on the

The celebration, which Zheng said took determination to pull off, defines the meaning of the Year of the Tiger.

The tiger is a sign of strength and power," he said. "We wish that people would be very strong and determined this year."

Because, on May 4, 1884, she bought a first-class ticket for a train and refused to sit in the "colored" section;

Because she lost her part-time teaching position for writing newspaper editorials that encouraged blacks to unite in defiance of "Separate but Equal" laws;

Because she worked as an investigative journalist to expose black lynching as southern terrorism, and risked her life by castigating white public officials who tolerated lynching;

Because she founded a women's club that established Chicago's first kindergarten in a black neighborhood;

Because she organized the Negro Fellowship League in 1910 to provide lodging, employment and social activities for young black men, who were excluded from the YMCA;

Because she led the protests that changed the YMCA's national whites-only

Ida Bell Wells is recognized as a woman who worked tirelessly for blacks' civil rights and equal justice for all people until her death in 1931.

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
