Rusty Couts, booking agent for United Entertainment, said part of the fun about seeing old metal bands was to actually see them up close.

"It's something kind of cool about seeing a band

that you saw in an arena years ago in a club now," Couts said. "There's nothing new and exciting - it's old and exciting."

He said the trend is spreading fast.

"('80s bands) are all jumping on the wagon now. They're not going to be playing clubs much longer," Couts said. "You're going to see them in bigger envi-

While Couts agreed there was a kitsch factor in seeing old metal bands, he said the music was ultimately what brought people to see the bands.

"There is a little funny quality to some of it, but I know myself and a lot of people go to these shows to hear the songs," Couts said.

Funny or not, Rigg said he was sure Quiet Riot, which has all its original members back, would be loud and rocking.

"They've never played here with all the original members, so I think it'll be a really good time," Rigg said. "I'm sure it's gonna' be huge."


