Accused murderer to get competency re-evaluation

Prosecutors will get a third opinion to determine if Gregory Gabel is competent to stand trial for the 1996 murder of UNL freshman Martina McMenamin.

District Court Judge Paul Merritt granted the Lancaster County Attorney's to evaluate Gabel at a hearing along Wednesday morning.

This motion follows evaluation by the court-appointed Lincoln Regional Center that last month found Gabel incompetent to stand trial.

The state appointed Dr. Park Dietz and associates of Newport Beach, Calif., to evaluate Gabel.

> Judge Merritt said he would consider the matter and make a decision by the end of the week.


