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ed with the company," he said.

Because the panelists have connections with Weidman, Bowlin said, they will talk about more than just facts about his life.

"They all know a lot of fun, anecdotal stuff, and they will have a lot of stories," he said.

Part of the presentation uses a video about Weidman, and Bowlin said it helps the audience by giving them visual elements of Weidman's choreography.

He encouraged people to come and be a part of the discussion because it is a chance to learn something new.

"It's a chance to learn about a person who was so very important in the evolution of modern dance," he said. "This is one of these gems in Nebraska that a lot of people don't know about."

He said he thought the event would have more excitement than most people might think.

"One can think it might be dry, but I think it should be fun," he said. "This is a neat way to learn about the early movement of modern dance and also what is different and unique about Weidman's style from others at that time."

"Dance and the Work of Charles Weidman" takes place Wednesday at 3:30 p.m. A reception begins at 3

Rob McConnell (of Rob McConnell and the Boss Brass), and all of his pieces are always ingeniously written rhythmically and technically," Sharp said.

The UNL Jazz Ensemble will play the jazz standard "Like Someone In Love," arranged by Roger Myers; McConnell's "Sambanice"; Julian "Cannonball" Adderley's "Things Are Getting Better," arranged by McConnell; David Berger's "Manquez Juste"; Duke Ellington's "In A Mellotone," arranged by Myers; Thad Jones' "Don't Get Sassy"; Sammy Nestico's "The Queen Bee"; and Billy Strayhorn's "Chelsea Bridge," arranged by Nestico.

Perhaps because two of McConnell's tunes are on the program, the saxophone section will have more to do than normal, Sharp said.

"Things Are Getting Better" features a tricky saxophone solo section where everyone in the section has a difficult part equivalent to an improvisation, Sharp said. In addition, there also is a short period of collective improvisation among the saxes in this piece.

"Oueen Bee" is one of the more fun pieces on the program for Sharp because it was the first straightahead swing tune he ever learned in junior high school, he said.

Also performing during the Wednesday night concert is the UNL Jazz Small Group. This group features Cory Biggerstaff on bass, Cain on tenor saxophone,
