The following is a list of goals ASUN has set, and the progress it has made 1. Continue commitment to diversity through sponsored events and increased communication with the campus community.

-Student Body President Sara Russell said ASUN is researching funding options for speakers for Martin Luther King Jr. Day on Jan. 19.

2. Maintain regular campuswide community service projects. — Ryan Anderson, chairman of the Campus Life Committee, said ASUN's next community service project will be with Habitat for Humanity.

3. Enhance technological services to students.

— An ASUN Public Relations Liaison will be appointed next week. Russell said the main job of the PR Liaison will be to update the ASUN Web page. ASUN also is looking for students to serve on the Technology Fees and Information Services Board. Interested students should go to the ASUN office, 115 Nebraska Union, for more information.

4. Research the options to make student evaluations more effective. — The senate last week approved the formation of a midsemester teaching evaluation form. Academic Committee Chairwoman Kara Slaughter said the evaluations would allow students to give feedback on teaching techniques. Slaughter said ASUN's "ultimate goal is to promote quality instruction." Students, instructors and staff may e-mail the committee at 00207838@bigred.unl.edu with any questions or suggestions.

5. Address campus parking concerns.

ASUN senators are continuing to research and discuss campus parking concerns.

6. Continue efforts to unite City and East campuses

— Members of ASUN are researching opportunities to increase shuttle transit services between City and East campuses. Russell said according to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln 12-year plan increased transit services eventually will be developed. However, Russell said there is "a definite need for transit services between campuses for students now."

7. Create a larger representation of students through outreach initiatives.

 Anderson said the Campus Life committee is reviewing a proposed ASUN bill to create a new student assembly that would meet on a trial-run basis. The 25 member assembly would be a check-and-balance measure to student government and would ensure a good cross-section of residence hall, commuter and greek students, he said.

8. Raise awareness of the proposed spending lid amendment to the Nebraska Constitution and the immediate effects imposed on UNL and its students.

— The Senale voted last week to accept Russell's suggestion to encourage the UNL community to wear blue, instead of red, to the Nebraska vs. Missouri football game Oct. 24. Russell said wearing "Blue to MU" will promote awareness of initiative 413, the proposed spending lid amendment that could cut \$20 million from the NU system's budget. "It's a symbol of how blue the university will be if the initiative is assed,"she said

9. Lobby for student input and concern regarding the ASUN government party system.

 Russell said she is looking through completed election party system surveys. She said she would try
to quantify students' responses based on general statements and similarities. Russell said she would
make a recommendation to the ASUN Electoral Commission next week on whether the current party system should be changed.

Work to promote alcohol awareness and education campuswide.

- ASUN will be working with Project C.A.R.E. and Party SMART, two UNL organizations that advocate llow risk drinking and alternatives to drinking, to promote education and awareness during National Alcohol Awareness Week Oct. 5-9.



Hooters officials robbed

Three officials for Hooters restaurants had their Lincoln hotel rooms burglarized this week by someone with a master key.

The Hooters officials are staying at the Villager Motor Inn, 5200 O St., while they are in town for the opening of Lincoln's first Hooters restaurant, 6811 O St.

Someone entered the hotel room of the Hooters director of operations between 6 p.m. Sunday and 3 a.m. Monday and stole \$3,666 worth of items, Lincoln Police Sgt. Ann Heermann said.

Missing were a laptop computer, printer, two airline tickets and two Hooters T-shirts.

Then Monday evening someone broke into the rooms of two Hooters trainers at the Villager Motor Inn, Heermann said.

Clothing and cash were taken from both rooms for losses totaling \$800 from one room and \$1,693 from the other.

Police believe someone used a master key to enter the hotel rooms, as there were no signs of forced entry.


