Huskers hope to right ship against Tech

Nebraska looks to rebound from three straight defeats

April has been the cruelest month for the Nebraska baseball team.

Starting with the three-game sweep by Texas A&M at the beginning of the month, the No. 24 Cornhuskers (30-13 overall, 13-8 in the Big 12 Conference) have gone 10-7 in April, including a dismal Big 12 record of 5-7 and a road record

Entering into April, NU was atop the Big 12 after a three-game sweep of Texas. Following the two losses to Missouri on April 24 and 25, Nebraska went from third in the conference standings to fifth, just ahead of Oklahoma

But after tonight's game at 7 with 14thranked Texas Tech (36-11, 16-6 in the Big 12) in Lubbock, the April deluge might be over, giving way to sunny skies in May. NU has a three-game series with the Red Raiders, including a doubleheader (starting at 2 p.m.) Saturday.

After losing their last three against Missouri and Creighton, the Huskers are hoping to duplicate last year's showing against Tech when NU took two of three at home from the Red Raiders.

However, that would prove to be no small task at this juncture, as Tech is on a roll through the backstretch of its season. Though on a losing skid of late, the Raiders are still 22-1 at home, having yet to lose a league contest, going 8-0, within the amicable confines of Dan Law Field.

Nebraska has not won on the road against Tech since 1991.

Still, the Raiders have expressed signs of a slump, losing three of their last seven, including their first home loss at the hands of the College of the Southwest by a count of 7-4.

As a squad, the Red Raiders are hitting .330 and the pitching staff is maintaining a 3.93

The Tech offense is led by left fielder Ryan Ruiz, who is hitting .385 and has scored 69 runs. Catcher Josh Bard is also providing some punch with a .337 average, 10 home runs and 22 dou-

On the mound, the Raiders boast a triple

threat in Shane Wright, Brad Ralston and Kevin Tracey, who have combined to start 37 of the team's 47 games.

Tracey is 9-1 with a 2.48 ERA, Ralston is 8-0, leading the team in strikeouts with 85 and Wright is 7-3 with a 4.20 ERA.

For the Huskers, first baseman and desig-

nated hitter Ken Harvey's batting average of .506 still leads the nation. Harvey is having a career-best season in the homer department

And despite hitting just .273 in April, NU is still hitting .332 as a team and the pitching staff holds steady with an ERA of 5.23
