Creighton also has six new players, five of them freshman.

How many of the freshmen see time depends on Creighton's needs and how well the players are adjusting, Altman said.

"Of those six, two or three of them are going to have to play a significant role for us if we're going to continue to press and play nine or 10 guys like we've been doing," Altman said.


