Huskers will start conference play against Tigers on Saturday

When the Nebraska softball team begins Big 12 play this weekend against Missouri, the Huskers will be on a five-game winning streak.

The Cornhuskers extended their winning streak to five games earlier this week with a two-game sweep over in-state rival Creighton.

The Huskers (18-15) will open conference play with a pair of games against the Tigers (24-10) scheduled to start at 1 p.m. Saturday and Sunday at the Nebraska Softball Complex.

Saturday's game against UM will give No. 26 Nebraska some national

exposure with Fox Sports Net scheduled to cover the game live.

Junior pitcher Penny Cope said it is very important for NU to get off to a good start in the conference.

"Just because our record isn't like we want it to be, people aren't going to take us very seriously," Cope said. "If we can come out and start strong with a couple of wins, I think we'll get the respect we deserve."

The kind of respect Cope wants for Nebraska is evident in the schedule the Huskers have played this season.

In the 33 games NU has played, 10 have been against top-10 opponents. The Huskers have been able to pull out wins in only two of those games -Oregon State and California.

Sophomore Heather Martin said even though NU has not had success against the nation's elite, the close losses will help them down the road.

"The season is a long road," Martin said. "We play a lot of tough teams to prepare us better. It is going to be a big advantage for us at the end of the season playing the kind of competition we

When Missouri comes into Lincoln it will be on an eight-game winning streak. The Tigers have won 15 of their last 17 games. One important note is that Missouri has played only two ranked teams all season, compared to the 11 NU has faced.

Van Horn said despite Nebraska's need to start sweeping Big 12 teams, the team is on a good

Last year, the team was 17-6 at this point and 5-4 after their first nine Big 12 games but finished the season by winning the Big 12 tournament.

"This year's team has a higher ceiling," he said. "Not everyone who can be a great hitter is hitting well. If we continue to get it together, this team can achieve great things."

Andy Bent, a junior relief pitcher, said the Husker players are feeling the pressure to start dominating Big 12 teams.

"We all know what it takes to get to the top of the conference," he said. "And we feel like it has to start with a sweep over Tech this week-

Bent said the team is confident it can make a move to sit atop the Big 12 standings at season's end, but he said the move must start soon.

"We can't win some and lose some," he said. "We need to start winning them all, and we need to do it before we dig ourselves too deep

The players believe they are capable of winning the conference, Bent said.

"Both sides of the ball are playing well," he said. "Our hitters are on a hot streak, and it's a lot easier to be a pitcher when your hitters are hot."

After this weekend's series, the Huskers will have played 16 games in 22 days, but Bent said that has only helped the team.

"It's a lot better playing a bunch of games in a row," he said. "It's tough to get up for practices, but playing in so many games keeps hot streaks alive."
