"Talent got us no damn where," Bradford said. "You saw where it got us - a 11-19 record."


Bradford said Collier was a "cool dude" and would be a good change for the team. Many of his teammates agreed.

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Lord injury leaves hole at quarterback position

The carpet that the Nebraska offense had been flying so high on throughout these first weeks of spring football was pulled out from underneath their feet during Wednesday afternoon's scrim-

However, the lackluster output was the least of Nebraska Coach Frank Solich's concerns when he saw budding freshman quarterback Jammal Lord go down with a most certain spring-ending injury to his left knee.

Dr. Robert Dugas, team orthopedic surgeon, said that it was an injury to the posterior cruciate ligament, and an MRI would need to be taken later this week to further determine Lord's near future.

Lord is the second NU quarterback to be sidelined during spring ball, with Eric Crouch still staying clear of contact after undergoing shoulder surgery following the Fiesta Bowl win over Tennessee.

The injury even prompted Solich to say a brief, but still excitement inducing, comment featuring the words Bobby Newcombe and quarterback again in the same sentence.

"Bobby could take a few snaps at quarterback," Solich said.

However, Solich was doubtful on the prospects of Newcombe's playing quarterback in

the spring game.

Instead, the unlikely spotlight is on sophomore Joe Chrisman, who will now most likely enter as the No. 1 quarterback for the Red-White Spring Game on April 15. Freshman Brett Lindstrom follows behind Chrisman on the depth

"You have to remember that those two quarterbacks are still young in the system," Solich said. "They can do a good job, but improving

The injury to Lord, who redshirted last season,

was a blow to an offense that had been clicking in all facets since the start of spring ball.

"The offense took a U-turn today. We had way too many motion penalties, which put us in long yardage situations," Solich said. "It may have been a case of not being ready to play, but they were off base a little bit today."

The offense also may be tamed on the variety of plays they run during the upcoming spring

"It will probably be much more fullback and Iback oriented," Solich said. "But it might be good. We can play that style of game very well right

The only bright spot of the day may have been an improvement on the defensive side of the ball.

"The defense played much better, was more aggressive and appeared to be headed in the right direction," Solich said.


Despite the struggle offensively and Lord's injury, NU will be in no hurry to put Crouch back on the field any sooner, Solich said.
