DURING the past few years the library accommodations have been greatly increased. It was not so very long ago that Miss Ellen Smith presided over the reading-room, the library, and exercised the functions of registrar. Then the library was opened only a few hours each day.

The work soon became too burdensome for one person and assistants were added, until to day we have, besides the librarian, several cataloguers and several assistants, while Miss Smith's time is entirely taken up with the duties of registrar.

To accommodate the increased demand of the students for more library hours, the library was opened every evening of the week except Saturday and Sunday evening and a night assistant employed. Last week the library was opened Saturday evening for the first time. This plan will be tried for some time, and if satisfactory remain the established rule.

There are, however, some who object to the new departure. Heretofore books could be taken out Saturday evening and kept till Monday morning without any difficulty. Now books cannot be taken out without the special permit of the professor to whose department the book belongs. Of course history and other reference books will, as a rule, have to remain in the library for those who wish to consult them Saturday evening. The only question is, will more be accommodated under the new regime than under the old?

A meeting of the contestants who expect to enter the local oratorical contest was held in chapel Wednesday afternoon. It was decided to recommend Saturday evening, Feb. 16, to the association as the date of the contest. The association meets to-day to decide this question as well as any other that may come up.
