**IOWA'S FOOTBALL TEAM.**  
The football team is hard at work these fine days, getting into condition to defeat every team that may oppose them this year. The material is good and heavy; our coach is a good one; and, best of all, everybody is getting enthusiastic on football lines. Every condition necessary to success on the gridiron is present, and this year's team will undoubtedly be the strongest that has ever represented the University.

As to the personnel of the team, it is impossible at this date to state definitely if whom it will consist, as the matter will be determined, in a great measure, by the work of the various candidates between now and the day following the Drake game—that is within a week.

Among the candidates for the line are Wright, R. D. Blackmore, Walker, A. H. Blackmore, Egan, Towle, Meister, Lamerton, Kligenberg, Warner, Kellogg, and possibly Myers. Wright will probably fill center, with Blackmore and Walker as guards. The rest of the places on the line may be divided among the other candidates in order of survival. Blackmore, Egan, and Towle are good strong men. Meister and Lamerton are playing wonderfully well, and Kligenberg is working hard. Warner played good football Saturday, and Kellogg is still in the lists. The line will probably average upwards of 200 pounds.

Deems and Griffith, the candidates for quarter, are having a lively battle for honors. Griffith was on the High School team last year, plays a snappy game, being excellent in defense, and not slow on the sprint. Deems, who is heavier, is strong on the tackle, and plays a surprisingly good game for a new man.

Holbrook, Gaines, Kemp, Sheldon, and Meyers are all strong candidates for halfbacks. Holbrook and Meyers have practiced only once or twice, but they will show their old strength. Gaines and Kemp each played well last Saturday, both making some long runs with the ball. Sheldon made two touchdowns and several gains in the same game, and is an all round good man.

The candidates for full-back are Hobbs, Bowles and Williams. Bowles and Williams are doing well, but Hobbs, who has the advantage of a large experience, will probably fill this position.

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
