Work on the cinder track has been postponed for a few days on account of the failure of the contractor to procure a number of scrapers. Only such work as is necessary to put the track into condition for practice will be done in the next two weeks.

The contestants in the field day, May 7, will be trained systematically if nothing else. Dr. Hastings has made out a prescription and schedule of work for every day's training from now until the date of the contest.

One week from tomorrow will occur the outdoor pentathlon. The prize in this contest will be the handsome new O'Mahoney \$20 gold medal. A prize of such value as this should and undoubtedly will call out a great number of contestants, as well as the best efforts of those engaged in the contest. Following are the events of the pentathlon: 100 yad dash, hammer throw, pole vault, running high jump and the one mile run. All entries must be in at 6 o'clock next Monday.

GIRLS' ATHLETIC CONTEST.

For the athletic contest open to girls in the first year class, the following prizes are offered: The first prize, \$5 fencing foils, by the FitzGerald Dry Goods company; the second, a tennis racket; and the third a pair of Indian clubs, given by C. W. Leighton.
