

**In the Gym.**

Preparations for the big field day go steadily on. Every one may see from ten to twenty athletes training on the campus. All together fully thirty men have entered for the contest.

GOOD OXEN RELAY  
All entries for the field day must be handed in by six o'clock Saturday afternoon, April 30. Those who neglect this important act will find that they have lost their chance of carrying off any of the prizes offered. It has been decided to charge each candidate in the field day twenty-five cents for every event in which he enters. This sum will be returned to the contestant as soon as he makes his appearance in the specified events. It is simply intended as a guarantee for the appearance of the contestant.

**OUTDOOR PENTATHLON.**

The annual out-door pentathlon was held on the University campus last Saturday afternoon and as a result Pillsbury captured first place, scoring 353 points; Jewett came in second best with 295 points; Kellogg third with 243 points. He failed however to qualify in the one hundred yard dash. It was a matter of universal regret that many University athletes refused to compete for fear of injuring their chances on field day, May 7. As there was a space of two weeks between the two events, their fear of over-doing themselves was hardly justified. However the contest went off exceedingly well although there were only five contestants.

Besides those who voluntarily absented themselves were a number who intended to enter the contest but were prevented by unavoidable circumstances. That fact that W. E. Anderson was unable to enter was very disappointing. More than one record has gone down before him and there are many who wish that he might have had an opportunity to show his powers on this occasion. B. M. LaSalle was laid up with an injury. Had he been able to enter he would doubtless have made it interesting for the winner.

Under the existing conditions the records made last Saturday are considered very favorably.

The five events and the results are as follows:

Pillsbury won first place with a total of 353 points.

Jewett won second place with a total of 295 points.

Kellogg stood third in number of points, running 243, but failed to qualify in the 100-yard dash.

One hundred yard-dash: Won by Pillsbury in 11 3/5 seconds; second, by Jewett, 11 4/5 seconds; third by Story, in 12 2/5 seconds.

Hammer throw: First place, Pillsbury, 46 ft. 9 in.; second place, Jewett, 36 ft. 1 in.; third place, Hunt, 37 ft. 9 in.

Pole vault: First place, Pillsbury, 8 ft. 11 in.; second place, Kellogg, 8 ft. 7 in.; third place, Jewett, 8 ft. 1 in.

Running high jump: First place, Pillsbury, 5 ft. 4 in.; second place, Jewett, 4 ft. 10 1/2 in.; third place, Hunt, 4 ft. 7 in.

1 mile run: First place, Jewett, 5 min. 28 sec.; second place, Pillsbury, 5 min. 33 sec.; third place, Kellogg, 5 min. 47 sec.

The officers were: Referee, Dr. B. Ward; scorers, L. S. Ryan, William L. J. Allen; judges, J. S. Gutter, R. D. Anderson, H. M. J. Allen; measurers, G. W. Snyder, C. J. Allen, W. H. H. Moore; time-keepers, Dr. A. R. Hill, S. A. White, A. A. Bischoff; marshal, G. J. Lyon; clerk of course, E. A. Moore; starter, William W. Hastings.

There were but five contestants in the five events.

A great deal of credit for the success of the pentathlon belongs to Mrs. P. A. O'Mahoney who presented the beautifully designed gold medal to the winner. The donor was so much pleased with the evidence of faithful work by the winner of the highest number of points that he waived the condition placed upon the medal for this year, that of winning at least 400 out of a possible 500 points, and awarded it to Mr. Pillsbury. If given next year, however, it will be upon the conditions published for this year.

A medal such as Mr. O'Mahoney offers should certainly be productive of bringing out more than five contestants and doubtless more will respond next year.

**KANSAS ATHLETICS.**
